Re: Carta de Apoyo para Estudios Étnicos en ARUSD (English Translation below)

SOMOS Mayfair apoya a los niños, organiza a las familias y conecta a los vecinos para elevar los sueños, el poder y el liderazgo de la comunidad y abordar las desigualdades sistémicas. Trabajamos con aliados en todo San José y nuestra mayor área de la bahía para promover la justicia económica, racial y social. **En nombre de las organizaciones e individuos enumerados a continuación, nos complace escribir en apoyo de la Resolución de Estudios Étnicos del Distrito Escolar Unificado de Alum Rock (ARUSD) que establecerá un Comité de Adopción de Estudios Étnicos para el Distrito Escolar Elemental de Alum Rock Union.**

Según una investigación revisada y encargada por la Asociación Nacional de Educación en 2011, hay pruebas considerables de que los planes de estudios étnicos tienen beneficios académicos y sociales positivos. Los beneficios de los estudios étnicos incluyen una mayor conciencia de los propios antecedentes culturales, la oportunidad de entender y apreciar muchas culturas y etnias que se encuentran en California, y una mayor autoestima y éxito académico. Además, según otro estudio llamado "Impacto de la Pedagogía de Estudios Étnicos en el Logro de Estudiantes Latinos", se han encontrado cursos de estudios étnicos para aumentar el rendimiento de los estudiantes de Latinx en las pruebas estandarizadas, mejorar sus habilidades de alfabetización, desarrollar relaciones más positivas estudiante-profesor, y sentirse más comprometidos en el aula.

Los estudios étnicos surgieron de los Derechos Civiles y de los movimientos del Frente de Liberación del Tercer Mundo de la década de 1960's y pidieron una educación totalmente inclusiva y culturalmente relevante que se centrara en la historia, la cultura, el idioma y la literatura de las personas de color en los Estados Unidos y a nivel mundial. ARUSD tiene la

suerte de tener la oportunidad única de servir a una de las poblaciones estudiantiles más diversas. Los estudios étnicos validarán las experiencias compartidas, la cultura y el patrimonio de todos los estudiantes, especialmente para los jóvenes estudiantes asiáticos, negros y latinos. Estudiantes de todas las edades y orígenes aprenderán, de primera mano, sobre las costumbres, la historia y las tradiciones de los diversos grupos raciales y étnicos que componen nuestro estado y escuelas. A medida que toda nuestra población estudiantil se vuelve cada vez más diversa, reconocemos la oportunidad que esta resolución representa para enseñar a los estudiantes acerca de su cultura, transformar su sentido de sí mismo y defender sus derechos humanos.

Además, creemos que la implementación del programa de Estudios Étnicos de ARUSD apoyará la promoción de la verdadera historia de las comunidades indígenas y hará valer sus derechos. De acuerdo con el artículo 13 de la Declaración de las Naciones Unidas sobre los Derechos de los Pueblos Indígenas (UNDRIP):

... Los pueblos indígenas tienen derecho a revitalizar, utilizar, desarrollar y transmitir a las generaciones futuras sus historias, lenguas, tradiciones orales, filosofías, sistemas de escritura y literatura, y a designar y conservar sus propios nombres para comunidades, lugares y personas.

ARUSD tiene la responsabilidad de enseñar a los estudiantes acerca de las contribuciones positivas de las comunidades étnicas a la historia de los Estados Unidos y también de aprender su cultura e historia nativa. Creemos que, dado nuestro clima nacional actual, nuestras instituciones de educación tienen una responsabilidad moral y social aún mayor de enseñar a los estudiantes sobre las culturas e historias de los demás y promover la unidad entre todos los estudiantes de todas las razas.

A medida que los estudios étnicos continúan siendo un requisito obligatorio de la escuela secundaria y la universidad a través del Proyecto de Ley de la Asamblea 331 (AB 331), el Proyecto de Ley de la Asamblea 3310 (AB 3310) y el Proyecto de Ley 1460 de la Asamblea (AB 1460), la implementación de los Estudios Étnicos ARUSD proporcionará a los estudiantes una educación de calidad bien redondeada, aumentará el éxito académico y se alinearán con muchos distritos escolares y universidades en todo el Estado de California.

Por último, recomendamos que los estudiantes, los padres y los profesionales calificados tengan aportes en el desarrollo e implementación de Estudios Étnicos con el fin de asegurar las voces de la comunidad, la equidad y la alineación con los requisitos de la Fórmula de Financiamiento de Control Local. Estos fondos están diseñados para beneficiar a los

estudiantes de bajos ingresos, inglés y jóvenes de cuidado de crianza y creemos que este plan de estudios debe ser una prioridad.

Al incorporar los estudios étnicos en el plan de estudios de la escuela, estamos seguros de que los estudiantes de ARUSD se convertirán en líderes, académicos y seres humanos socialmente más exitosos. Aplaudimos el liderazgo del Distrito Escolar de Alum Rock al considerar esta resolución y esperamos llevar estudios étnicos a nuestros estudiantes de primaria y secundaria. **Nosotros queremos que la mesa directiva apruebe inmediatamente la Resolución de Estudios Étnicos de ARUSD.**

Re: English- Letter of Support for Ethnic Studies in ARUSD

SOMOS Mayfair supports children, organizes families, and connects neighbors to uplift the dreams, power, and leadership of community and address systemic inequities. We work with allies throughout San Jose and our greater Bay Area to promote economic, racial and social justice. On behalf of the organizations and individuals listed below, we are pleased to write in support of the **Alum Rock Unified School District (ARUSD) Ethnic Studies Resolution that will establish an Ethnic Studies Adoption Committee for the Alum Rock Union Elementary School District.**

According to research reviewed and commissioned by the National Education Association in 2011, there is considerable evidence that Ethnic Studies curricula have positive academic and social benefits. The benefits of Ethnic Studies include increased awareness of one's own cultural background, the opportunity to understand and appreciate many cultures and ethnicities found in California, and enhanced self-esteem and academic success. Furthermore, according to another study called the "Impact of Ethnic Studies Pedagogy on Latinx Student Achievement", Ethnic Studies courses have been found to boost Latinx students' performance on standardized tests, enhance their literacy skills, developed more positive student-teacher relationships, and felt more engaged in the classroom.

Ethnic Studies grew out of the Civil Rights and Third World Liberation Front of the 1960's and called for a fully inclusive and culturally relevant education that focused on the history, culture, language and literature of people of color in the United States and globally. ARUSD is fortunate to have the unique opportunity to serve one of the most diverse student populations. Ethnic Studies will validate the shared experiences, culture and heritage of all students, especially for young Asian, Black and Latino students. Students of all ages and backgrounds will learn, firsthand, about the customs, history, and traditions of the various racial and ethnic groups that make up our state and schools. As our entire student

population becomes increasingly diverse, we recognize the opportunity that this resolution represents to teach students about their culture, transform their sense of self, and uphold their human rights.

In addition we believe implementing the ARUSD's Ethnic Studies program will support promoting the true history of indigenous communities and assert their rights. According to article 13 of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP):

...Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons.

ARUSD has the responsibility to teach students about the positive contributions of Ethnic communities to United States history and to also learn their native culture and history. We believe that given our current national climate, our institutions of education have an even greater moral and social responsibility to teach students about each other's cultures and histories and promote unity between all students of all races.

As Ethnic Studies continues to become a mandatory high school and college requirement via Assembly Bill 331 (AB 331), Assembly Bill 3310 (AB 3310) and Assembly Bill 1460 (AB 1460), the implementation of ARUSD Ethnic Studies will provide students with a well rounded quality education, increase academic success, and align itself with many schools districts and universities across the State of California.

Lastly, we recommend that students, parents, and qualified professionals have input in the development and implementation of Ethnic Studies in order to ensure community voices, equity and alignment with Local Control Funding Formula requirements. Such funds are designed to benefit low income, English learners and foster care youth and we believe this curriculum should be a priority.

By incorporating Ethnic Studies into the school curriculum, we are confident that ARUSD students will become even more successful leaders, scholars, and socially just human beings. We applaud the Alum Rock School District's leadership in considering this resolution and look forward to bringing Ethnic Studies to our elementary and middle school students. **We urge the board to pass the ARUSD Ethnic Studies Resolution immediately.**
